Delivering my maiden speech, May 2010

#### IN WESTMINSTER

Back in May, I delivered my maiden speech to the House of Commons. This was a proud moment, a real chance to stand up for Spelthorne and express my views on national issues.

The past six months have been very busy from the Government's point of view. The most significant moment was October's comprehensive spending review, and its policies, which will reduce our national deficit.

Scrutinizing new policies is an important part of our democracy. I have taken every opportunity to engage in the frequent debates held in the chamber.

The spending review is right and responsible. On October 28th, I explained to the House why: "The cuts are necessary. After all, £1 in every £4 we spent was borrowed, which was unsustainable. No one in their right mind would lead their private life on that basis. We cannot keep on borrowing and spending. These are obvious truths, which we have recognised and addressed." Acting now will ensure that Britain is more prosperous at the end of this Parliament than it is now.

### Sitting on the Transport Select Committee

In June, I was elected to sit on the Transport Select Committee. This is a working group of all parties that holds the Government to account on transport policy.

I am also scrutinizing transport development plans around the country; in Hull, we listened to plans to develop the UK's greenest offshore wind manufacturing facility, and improve transport infrastructure to support this.

From a local perspective, the future of Heathrow, the possible development of Airtrack, and the Crossrail project are key concerns. Transport is vital to our local economy, affects the environment and our day to-day-lives. Being a member of this committee puts me in a position to keep a close eye on policies that will affect Spelthorne. This is exactly what I'll be doing into the New Year.
